REPORT ON THE ART DEPARTMENT.

The progress which has been made during the year by the Art Department of the Museum is best reported by the list of loans, accessions and gifts.

Among these gifts is one which initiates the policy of procuring a representative exhibit for contemporary American painting. Still another, materially assists the foundation of a photograph Museum. Another gift places the Museum among the foremost of American institutions in its exhibits of European china. Another gift has so supplemented the fine collection of ancient glass, that it now has only one superior in this country.

The systematic development of a consecutive and balanced exhibit for the entire field of Art History, as far as represented by casts, is hoped for after the completion of the new section of the Museum building.

Meantime the instruction in the consecutive evolution of the history of civilization, which it is the principal mission of a Museum of Art History to furnish, is assisted by a systematically arranged series of lectures, moving in sequence from the earliest to the latest period of Art History. This course, which covers four years, will reach its fourth and last stage during the coming season and will probably be repeated.
